Lesson 1

Lesson 1: Have to haben: German Verb Comedy Drill

Learn the German verb haben ('have') with a fun, short lesson in English and German. Practice all present-tense forms – ich habe, du hast, er hat, sie hat, es hat, wir haben, ihr habt, sie haben – through jokes, dialogues, and quick quizzes. Great for beginners and anyone who wants a fast refresher.

Quick mission: you'll use haben like a pro in minutes. Stay till the end for a speed challenge and a mini-quiz!

Your Goal Today

Say it out loud and own it.

Chant with me: base verb haben. Now the present forms: ich habe, du hast, er hat, sie hat (she), es hat, wir haben, ihr habt, sie haben (they). One more time – faster: ich habe – du hast – er hat – sie hat – es hat – wir haben – ihr habt – sie haben.

Quick Examples You Can Use

Repeat after me – they're short and super practical.

- I have coffee – ich habe Kaffee.
- You (one friend) have the tickets – du hast die Tickets.
- He has an idea – er hat eine Idee.
- She has time – sie hat Zeit.
- It has four wheels – es hat vier Räder.
- We have a plan – wir haben einen Plan.
- You all have snacks – ihr habt Snacks.
- They have the keys – sie haben die Schlüssel.

Funny Mini-Dialogue

Listen closely and then echo the lines.

- A: Do we have food? – B: Wir haben Brot und Käse.
- A: And you, do you have money? – B: Du hast doch das Portemonnaie!

- A: He has the map, right? – B: Ja, er hat die Karte.
- A: She has the best jokes. – B: Sie hat die besten Witze!
- A: Our robot? – B: Es hat WLAN.
- Coach: Team, ihr habt alles gegeben! Crowd: Wir haben gewonnen!
- Announcer: The neighbors? – Sie haben einen Hund.

Call-and-Response Drill

I cue in English; you answer in German. Say it before I reveal it!

- You (sg) have the keys – du hast die Schlüssel.
- He has no time – er hat keine Zeit.
- We have a question – wir haben eine Frage.
- You all have great energy – ihr habt tolle Energie.
- They have a car – sie haben ein Auto.
- I have an idea – ich habe eine Idee.
- It has a red roof – es hat ein rotes Dach.
- She has my book – sie hat mein Buch.

Culture Tip

Here's a nugget you'll actually use.

German uses *haben* for possession and set expressions: *ich habe Hunger* (I'm hungry), *ich habe Durst* (I'm thirsty), *ich habe Zeit* (I have time). But for age, use "to be": say *ich bin 20*, not "I have 20."

Pop Quiz

Answer out loud. I'll give you a beat, then the key.

- Q1) Translate: We have no time. A) Wir haben keine Zeit.
- Q2) Translate: She has a cat. A) Sie hat eine Katze.
- Q3) Translate: You all have two tickets. A) Ihr habt zwei Tickets.
- Q4) What's the base verb for "have" in German? A) haben.

Challenge: Speed Conjugation

Do the full present tense in order. Go!

Say it in 6 seconds: Answer: *ich habe, du hast, er hat, sie hat, es hat, wir haben, ihr habt, sie haben*. Victory dance optional.

Wrap-Up

Nice work – high five!

You crushed *haben*: *ich habe, du hast, er hat, sie hat, es hat, wir haben, ihr habt, sie haben*. Thanks for listening!

Your Goal Today

By the end, you'll use 'to be' in all key forms with confidence.

Goal check: master sein in the present – ich bin, du bist, er ist, sie ist, es ist, wir sind, ihr seid, sie sind. If you can say those smoothly, you win.

Forms \ Rhythm

Clap or tap as we groove the forms; repeat after me.

- I am – ich bin.
- You are (one friend) – du bist.
- He is – er ist.
- She is – sie ist.
- It is – es ist.
- We are – wir sind.
- You are (you all) – ihr seid.
- They are – sie sind.
- Base form – sein.
- Bonus chant: ich bin, du bist, er/sie/es ist, wir sind, ihr seid, sie sind!

Funny Dialogue

Here's a tiny sitcom – listen, then echo the German parts.

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- Roommate A: "Who left the fridge open?" Roommate B: "es ist a mystery... but ich bin innocent!"
 - A: "Dude, du bist standing in front of the fan." B: "Exactly – es ist hot."
 - A: "Where's Max?" B: "er ist in the park."
 - A: "And Anna?" B: "sie ist late but fabulous."
 - A: "So, team, wir sind ready?" Crowd: "ihr seid loud... and sie sind already dancing!"

Rapid-Fire Drills

Your turn – speak fast and smile; I'll cue you with English.

- Say: I am ready – ich bin bereit.
- Say: you are my friend (to one person) – du bist mein Freund (or Freundin).
- Say: he is here – er ist hier.
- Say: she is tired – sie ist müde.
- Say: it is cold – es ist kalt.
- Say: we are a team – wir sind ein Team.
- Say: you all are amazing – ihr seid großartig.
- Say: they are ready – sie sind bereit.
- Infinitive check: to be – sein.

Culture Tip

A quick culture nugget to make your German feel alive.

In Germany you'll hear slogans like "Du bist Berlin" and football chants "Wir sind die Besten!" Notice how "bist" and "sind" reveal person and number – no subject needed sometimes, but we'll keep it clear here with ich bin, du bist, er ist, sie ist, es ist, wir sind, ihr seid, sie sind.

Quiz Time

Answer out loud; I'll reveal it after a beat.

- Q1: German for 'to be'? A: sein.
- Q2: 'We are' in German? A: wir sind.
- Q3: 'She is'? A: sie ist.
- Q4: 'You are' to a group of friends? A: ihr seid.
- Q5: Fill the blank: " - - - müde" = he is tired. A: er ist.
- Q6: True or false: sie sind means 'they are'. A: True!
- Q7: Bonus: Say 'I am here' – A: ich bin hier.

Challenge \ Outro

One last push, then we celebrate.

Your goal today

You and I will lock in all present-tense forms plus the handy phrase for 'it's okay.' Ready?

- Infinitive: gehen.
- I go: ich gehe.
- You go (singular, friendly): du gehst.
- He goes: er geht.
- She goes: sie geht.
- It's okay / it goes: es geht.
- We go: wir gehen.
- You go (plural): ihr geht.
- They go: sie gehen.

Beat the forms

Clap or tap along; I'll say it, you echo it after the pause.

- Say: ich gehe.
- Say: du gehst.
- Say: er geht.
- Say: sie geht.
- Say: es geht.
- Say: wir gehen.
- Say: ihr geht.

-
- Say: sie gehen.
 - Bonus chant: Boom – clap – gehen, boom – clap – gehen!

Mini sketch: Coffee shop chaos

Here's a tiny scene – listen, laugh, then repeat the German lines after each pause.

- You: I'm caffeinated – ich gehe to the bakery.
- Friend: Green light! du gehst first, I'll follow.
- Narrator: Look – er geht left, dramatic cape included.
- Narrator: And sie geht right, pretending it's cardio.
- Cashier: How's your day? You shrug: es geht.
- Team chant: Let's do this – wir gehen together!
- Guide to the group: Folks, ihr geht inside, snacks first.
- Boss whispers: Meeting's over – sie gehen now before the cookies vanish.

Culture tip: The mighty es geht

Level up your small talk like a local.

In German, people often ask Wie geht's? A very natural, modest reply is es geht – meaning 'so-so' or 'it's okay.' Pro tip: Use gehen for going on foot and save fahren for vehicles. Your sneakers say gehen; your bus says fahren.

Lightning drills

Quick call-and-response – answer out loud after the pause.

- Say ‘we go’ in German. Answer: wir gehen.
- Say ‘you go’ (singular, friendly). Answer: du gehst.
- Say ‘they go’. Answer: sie gehen.
- Say ‘she goes’. Answer: sie geht.
- Say ‘he goes’. Answer: er geht.
- Say ‘it’s okay’. Answer: es geht.

Speed rhyme

Repeat the rhyme twice; let the rhythm carry you.

We stand, we see, we go – wir stehen, wir sehen, wir gehen – and if asked ‘How’s it?’ say es geht!

Your turn: 20-second challenge

Create your own two-line mini story using any three forms.

- Prompt idea: ‘At 8, ich gehe to the gym; at 9, wir gehen for coffee; by 10, sie gehen to work.’
- Now you: speak your version out loud.
- Bonus: Point to a door and declare one form dramatically – ihr geht or du gehst – like a movie director.
