Your goal today

By the end, you'll confidently say who has what in Spanish – no overthinking, just speaking.

- have → tener
- I have → yo tengo
- you have (singular) → tú tienes
- he has → él tiene
- she has → ella tiene
- it has → tiene
- we have → tenemos
- you have (plural) → vosotros tenéis
- they have → ellos tienen

Cheat sheet: say it out loud

Repeat after me and keep it light – your tongue can do push-ups too.

- I have – yo tengo
- you have – tú tienes
- he has – él tiene
- she has – ella tiene
- it has – tiene
- we have – tenemos

- you have (plural) – vosotros tenéis
- they have – ellos tienen

Mini dialogue: the concert plan

Let's jump into a tiny, funny scene – you're going to sound great.

- You: I have the tickets. → Yo tengo las entradas.
- Friend: Do you have snacks? → ¿Tú tienes bocadillos?
- You: He has the map. → Él tiene el mapa.
- You: She has the water. → Ella tiene el agua.
- Friend (pointing at the phone): It has 100\
- You (to the group): We have a plan. → Tenemos un plan.
- You (to your friends in Spain): You have the keys! → ¡Vosotros tenéis las llaves!
- Narrator: They have questions, but also great vibes. → Ellos tienen preguntas, pero también buen rollo.

Drill: quick swaps

I cue in English, you fire back in Spanish – nice and loud.

- I have → say yo tengo
- you have (sing.) → say tú tienes
- he has → say él tiene

- she has → say ella tiene
- it has → say tiene
- we have → say tenemos
- you have (plural) → say vosotros tenéis
- they have → say ellos tienen

Culture tip: real-life tener

Tiny pro tip that saves you blushes in Spanish.

In Spanish, age and some feelings use tener, not 'to be': 'I have 20 years' = tengo 20 años; 'we have cold' = tenemos frío; 'she has hunger' = ella tiene hambre. Use these and you'll sound instantly more natural.

Pop quiz time

Quick test – answer out loud, then check yourself.

- Q1) Translate 'he has' → A: él tiene
- Q2) Translate 'we have' → A: tenemos
- Q3) Translate 'it has' → A: tiene
- Q4) Translate 'they have' → A: ellos tienen
- Q5) In Spain, 'you have' (plural, friends) → A: vosotros tenéis

Challenge round

Now you lead – make the language yours.

- Say: I have two tickets. → Sample: Yo tengo dos entradas.
- Ask a friend: Do you have time? → Sample: ¿Tú tienes tiempo?
- Say: She has the idea, he has the pen. → Sample: Ella tiene la idea, él tiene el bolígrafo.
- Say to a group in Spain: You have the best seats! → Sample: ¡Vosotros tenéis los mejores asientos!
- Finish: We have everything; they have questions. → Sample: Tenemos todo; ellos tienen preguntas.

Wrap-up and next steps

Nice work – your brain just leveled up.

You'll say who you are, who they are, and what it is – clearly and confidently – using yo soy, tú eres, él es, ella es, es, somos, vosotros sois, and ellos son.

The forms, made silly

Repeat after me – and yes, you're allowed to grin.

- Base idea: to be = ser. Identity mode: ON.
- I am = yo soy. Example: I am unstoppable before coffee.
- You are (a friend) = tú eres. Example: You are the snack hero.
- He is = él es. Example: He is the playlist boss.
- She is = ella es. Example: She is the queen of comfy hoodies.
- It is = es. Example: It is a terrible idea... that we love.
- We are = somos. Example: We are a team of caffeine-powered geniuses.
- You all are (Spain, informal) = vosotros sois. Example: You are the legends of group chats.

- They are = ellos son. Example: They are champions of last-minute plans.

Mini dialogue: Introductions

Act it out with me – point, smile, and speak up.

- You: Hi, I'm Alex. In Spanish: yo soy Alex.
- You (pointing to your friend): él es Sam. He's the DJ.
- You (gesturing to a woman): ella es Mia – she is the coach.
- You (holding a flyer): es una buena idea ir. It is a good idea to go.
- Group cheer: somos amigos y ellos son los nuevos del equipo. We are friends, and they are the newcomers.

Call-and-repeat drill

Say it out loud – your mic is your mouth. I'll cue, you answer after the pause.

- Say “to be” in Spanish. Answer: ser.
- Say “I am.” Answer: yo soy.
- Say “you are” to a friend. Answer: tú eres.
- Say “he is.” Answer: él es.
- Say “she is.” Answer: ella es.
- Say “it is.” Answer: es.

- Say “we are.” Answer: somos.
- Say “you all are” (Spain, informal). Answer: vosotros sois.
- Say “they are.” Answer: ellos son.

Culture tip: Spain vs. elsewhere

Small map, big difference – no stress!

In Spain, friends in a group hear vosotros sois. In Latin America (and formally in Spain), you’ll hear “you all are” as ustedes son. For today’s list, keep practicing vosotros sois so you’re ready for Spain – and still understand the rest of the Spanish-speaking world.

Lightning quiz

Quick questions, quick wins – shout the answers.

- Q: Translate “We are engineers.” Just the verb. A: somos.
- Q: “It is Monday” – what’s the Spanish ‘it is’? A: es.
- Q: “They are winners” – start with ‘they are’. A: ellos son.
- Q: “You are” to a single friend. A: tú eres.
- Q: “You all are” to friends in Madrid. A: vosotros sois.

Speak-up challenge

Time to own it – make it yours.

- 1) Introduce yourself: “yo soy + your name/profession.”
- 2) Point out two people: “ellos son + who they are.”
- 3) Make a bold label: “es + a true statement” (e.g., es verdad). Bonus in Spain: praise your group with vosotros sois increíbles.

Wrap-up and gracias

Nice work – you showed up and spoke up.

Form jam: move with the beat

Say it out loud with me – tiny steps, big memory. March in place!

- Infinitive: to go → ir
- I go → yo voy
- He goes → él va; She goes → ella va
- We go → vamos
- You (plural) go → vosotros vais
- They go → ellos van
- Lifesaver mood check: be okay → estar bien
- Call-and-response groove: voy – vas – va – vamos – vais – van... but today we spotlight: yo voy, él va, ella va, vamos, vosotros vais, ellos van.

Mini-dialogues on the move

Listen, echo, smile. Short, real, and a little silly.

- A: Ready? We go now. B: Yes – vamos ahora.
- A: He goes by bus. B: Sí, él va en autobús.
- A: She goes home. B: Ella va a casa.
- A: Where do they go? B: Ellos van al parque.
- Guide: You (plural) go first. Group: ¡Entendido! Vosotros vais primero.
- A: I want to go. B: Perfecto: Quiero ir.
- A: Is it going to be okay? B: Sí, va a estar bien.

Culture bite: the power of ¡vamos!

At soccer games you'll hear one word a lot: ¡vamos! It means "let's go!"

- Fans chant ¡vamos! to push the team forward – instant energy.
- Spain tip: addressing friends as a group? Say "you (plural) go" with vosotros vais. In much of Latin America, people say ustedes van – but today your target is vosotros vais.
- When plans change, breathe: estar bien – it'll be okay. Your Spanish journey? Definitely estar bien.
