Your goal today

By the end, you'll confidently say every key form of have in English and avoir in French. Repeat after me as needed.

- have → avoir
- I have → j'ai
- you have (singular, informal) → tu as
- he has → il a
- she has → elle a
- it has → il a
- we have → nous avons
- you have (plural/formal) → vous avez
- they have → ils ont

Quick forms remix

Echo these like a beat – short, sharp, and fun. You've got this!

- I have a coffee → j'ai un café.
- You have time → tu as le temps.
- He has the keys → il a les clés.
- She has a ticket → elle a un billet.

- It has two wheels → il a deux roues.
- We have a plan → nous avons un plan.
- You have a reservation → vous avez une réservation.
- They have the map → ils ont la carte.

Comedy mini-scene

Picture this: a chaotic trip, one backpack, three snacks, and zero chill. Repeat the French lines after me.

- You: Do we have the tickets? Friend: Yes, nous avons les billets!
- You: Do you have the keys? Friend: Oui, tu as... oh wait – il a les clés!
- You: Who has snacks? Friend: elle a des biscuits, ils ont des pommes.
- Guide: Good news – you (plural) have a free upgrade! Guide in French: vous avez un surclassement gratuit !
- Narrator: Relax. You have everything. In French: vous avez tout.

Culture tip: idioms with avoir

French uses avoir for feelings and age – don't let English trick you.

- I am hungry → literally “I have hunger”: j'ai faim.
- I am hot/cold → j'ai chaud / j'ai froid.

- I am 20 (years old) → j'ai 20 ans.
- He has luck → means “He's lucky”: il a de la chance.
- We have fear → “We're afraid”: nous avons peur.

Call-and-response drill

I say English, you fire back in French. Big voice, big victory!

- have → avoir
- I have a question → j'ai une question
- you have a message (singular) → tu as un message
- he has a bike → il a un vélo
- she has time → elle a du temps
- it has four legs → il a quatre pattes
- we have two tickets → nous avons deux billets
- you have a table (plural/formal) → vous avez une table
- they have a car → ils ont une voiture

Lightning quiz

Fast and fun – answer out loud, then I'll reveal it. Go!

- Q: What's French for have? A: avoir
- Q: Say I have in French. A: j'ai
- Q: Say you have (singular, a pen). A: tu as un stylo

- Q: Say he has the ball. A: il a le ballon
- Q: Say she has an idea. A: elle a une idée
- Q: Say it has a camera. A: il a une caméra
- Q: Say we have time. A: nous avons du temps
- Q: Say you have (plural) tickets. A: vous avez des billets
- Q: Say they have money. A: ils ont de l'argent

Daily challenge

Lock it in with a tiny real-life mission today. You've got this!

- Make three real sentences: I have..., You have..., We have... and say them again in French: j'ai..., tu as..., nous avons...
- Spot an object near you and describe it: “It has...” → il a... (e.g., il a deux boutons).
- Ask a friend: “Do you have time?” then give yourself the French version: tu as du temps ? / vous avez du temps ?

Wrap-up

Amazing work! You just conquered have and avoir.

Lesson 2: French to be – être: Speak I am, You are with confidence

Master the French verb to be – être – with clear examples, humor, and quick drills. Practice I am je suis, you are tu es/vous êtes, he is il est, she is elle est, it is c'est, and we are nous sommes, plus the infinitive être. Build confidence using these forms in real conversations.

Today we unlock the French verb to be – être. It's the backbone of identity, the glue of sentences, and occasionally the reason a croissant says, “Let me être myself!”

Your goal today

You'll master the everyday forms – short, punchy, and super usable. Say them out loud with me!

- I am → je suis
- you are (informal) → tu es
- he is → il est
- she is → elle est
- it is / this is → c'est
- we are → nous sommes
- you are (formal/plural) → vous êtes
- the infinitive be → être

Forms you need – quick map

Repeat after me – short and sweet. Ready?

- I am = je suis
- You are (informal) = tu es
- He is = il est
- She is = elle est
- It is / This is = c'est
- We are = nous sommes
- You are (formal/plural) = vous êtes
- To be = être

Mini-dialog: the confident croissant

Let's stage a tiny comedy scene. You play the hero of breakfast.

- You point to the pastry: "It is perfect!" → "C'est parfait!"
- Croissant (posing): "I am buttery." → "Je suis beurré."
- You to your friend: "You are brave – share it!" → "Tu es courageux!"
- Narrator: "He is late, but smiling." → "Il est en retard, mais souriant."
- Narrator: "She is ready to learn." → "Elle est prête à apprendre."
- Guide to the group: "You are amazing." → "Vous êtes incroyables."
- All together: "We are happy!" → "Nous sommes heureux!"

Culture tip: **c'est** vs **il est/elle est**

Here's the classy French distinction – use it and you'll sound instantly smoother.

Use **c'est** before a noun with an article: "It is a good idea" → "C'est une bonne idée." Use **il est/elle est** before adjectives or known roles: "He is tired" → "Il est fatigué." "She is doctor" (profession, no article) → "Elle est médecin."

Rhythm drill: clap the verb **être**

Clap the beat and speak – your memory loves rhythm.

- Clap 1: I am – je suis. Clap 2: you are – tu es.
- Clap 1: he is – il est. Clap 2: she is – elle est.
- Clap 1: it is – c'est. Clap 2: we are – nous sommes.
- Clap 1: you are (formal/plural) – vous êtes. Clap 2: be – être.

Drills you can use right now

Say these out loud – own the sentences.

- I am ready → je suis prêt/prête.
- You are kind (informal) → tu es gentil/gentille.
- He is here → il est ici.
- She is at home → elle est à la maison.
- It is a good idea → c'est une bonne idée.
- We are on time → nous sommes à l'heure.
- You are welcome (to a group) → vous êtes les bien-venus.
- To be honest → être honnête.

Lightning quiz

Quick fire! Answer fast, then I reveal the French.

- Q: How do you say “I am”? A: je suis.
- Q: Informal “you are”? A: tu es.
- Q: “He is tired”? A: il est fatigué.
- Q: “She is ready”? A: elle est prête.
- Q: “It is true”? A: c'est vrai.
- Q: “We are happy”? A: nous sommes heureux.
- Q: Formal/plural “you are”? A: vous êtes.
- Q: The infinitive “to be”? A: être.

Challenge: be bold with être

Your turn – mini monologue. Keep it playful.

- Say: “I am from ... and I am ready.” → “Je suis de ... et je suis prêt/prête.”
- Point to your plan and label it: “It is smart.” → “C'est malin.”
- Tell a friend: “You are amazing.” (informal) → “Tu es incroyable.”
- Address your team: “You are the best!” → “Vous êtes les meilleurs !”
- Finish strong: “We are done – time to be proud.” → “Nous sommes finis – temps d'être fier/fière !”

Wrap-up

Nice work! You just leveled up your French core verb superpower.
