Your goal today

By the end, you'll master the Icelandic present of 'have' and use it with confidence.

Goal: know and say the base verb hafa and its forms: ég hef, þú hefur, hann hefur, hún hefur, það hefur, við höfum, þið hafið, þau hafa. You've got this!

Forms you can shout over lava

Repeat after me, nice and clear. I'll cue you and give a beat.

- Base: to have = hafa.
- I have = ég hef.
- You have (singular) = þú hefur.
- He has = hann hefur.
- She has = hún hefur.
- It has = það hefur.
- We have = við höfum.
- You have (plural) = þið hafið.
- They have = þau hafa.
- Mini-drill: say 'I have time' → Ég hef tíma.
- Say 'You (sg) have my thanks' → Þú hefur mínar þakkir.
- Say 'We have a plan' → Við höfum áætlun.

Cafe and weather banter

Let's drop your new superpower into funny everyday lines.

- At the café: 'We have coffee and tea' → Við höfum kaffi og te.
- Keys check: 'I have the keys' → Ég hef lykla.
- Encouraging a friend: 'You (sg) have this!' → Þú hefur þetta.
- Brag for your buddy: 'He has finished' → Hann hefur klárað.
- Good news: 'She has time' → Hún hefur tíma.
- Weather report: 'It has rained all day' → Það hefur rígt allan daginn.
- Team stocktake: 'We have enough' → Við höfum nóg.
- Group win: 'You (pl) have tickets' → Þið hafið miða.
- Proud moment: 'They have finished the work' → Þau hafa lokið vinnunni.

Culture tip: 'have' vs 'own'

Tiny but mighty tip to sound natural.

Use hafa for 'have' in many states and as an auxiliary (like perfect tense), but use eiga for owning things. So 'I have a cold' → Ég hef kvef, but 'I have/own a car' → Ég á bíl. Your Icelandic just leveled up.

Lightning quiz

Answer out loud; I'll reveal the solution after the pause.

- Q1: Say 'You (sg) have time.' A: Þú hefur tíma.
- Q2: Say 'He has never been there.' A: Hann hefur aldrei verið þar.
- Q3: Say 'We have no time today.' A: Við höfum engan tíma í dag.
- Q4: Say 'You (pl) have my support.' A: Þið hafið minn stuðning.
- Q5: Say 'They have two cats.' A: Þau hafa tvo ketti.
- Bonus: What's the base verb? A: hafa.

Speed challenge

Deep breath – quick fire! You've got this.

- Say 'I have finished.' Ég hef klárað.
- Say 'It has stopped working.' Það hefur hætt að virka.
- Say 'She has a new idea.' (use 'has') Hún hefur nýja hugmynd.
- Say 'We have a map.' Við höfum kort.
- Say 'You (sg) have my thanks.' Þú hefur mínar þakkir.

Wrap-up and thanks

You crushed it – nice work!

Your goal today

By the end, du can introduce people and things with confidence. Say each form after me.

- to be → vera
- I am → ég er
- you are (sing.) → þú ert
- he is → hann er
- she is → hún er
- it is → það er
- we are → við erum
- you are (pl.) → þið eruð
- they are → þau eru

Mini rhythms

Clap the beat and speak the form; rhythm helps memory.

- Beat 1-2-3-4: I am – ég er.
- Beat 1-2-3-4: you are – þú ert.
- Beat 1-2-3-4: we are – við erum.
- Beat 1-2-3-4: they are – þau eru.

Tiny dialogues

Act both roles, du; extra points for dramatic eyebrows.

- A: Who are you? B: I am – ég er Alex.
- A: Where is Jon? B: Hann er hér.
- A: And Anna? B: Hún er heima.
- A: What is that? B: Það er bók.
- Guide: Þið eruð hér, welcome inside.
- Host: Those people? Þau eru gestir okkar.

Rapid-fire drills

I say English; you shout the Icelandic. Du got this!

- to be → vera
- I am ready → ég er tilbúin/tilbúinn
- you are my friend (sing.) → þú ert vinur minn/vinkona mín
- he is at home → hann er heima
- she is not here → hún er ekki hér
- it is cold → það er kalt
- we are friends → við erum vinir
- you are on time (pl.) → þið eruð á réttum tíma
- they are from Iceland → þau eru frá Íslandi

Culture tip

Sound like a local and avoid funny mix-ups.

For mixed groups, say þau eru (not the masculine-only form); at games you might hear fans chant Við erum Ísland; and on maps, a pin says þú ert hér for one person or þið eruð hér for a group.

Pop quiz

Answer out loud; I will pause before revealing.

- Q: Translate 'she is'. A: hún er.
- Q: Translate 'we are'. A: við erum.
- Q: Translate 'it is'. A: það er.
- Q: Translate 'you are' to a group. A: þið eruð.
- Q: The base form 'to be'. A: vera.

Your challenge

Record a 20-second brag; use every form once.

Say this mini-speech and swap in your own words: I am – ég er ...; you are – þú ert ...; he is – hann er ...; she is – hún er ...; it is – það er ...; we are – við erum ...; you are (pl.) – þið eruð ...; they are – þau eru ...; key word to remember – vera.

- they go → þau fara

Mini dialogue: Bus or bust?

Listen in, du – then echo the punchlines.

- A: Shall we go now?
- B: Yes, we go – við förum núna.
- A: If it rains, she goes by bus – hún fer með strætó.
- B: He goes home – hann fer heim.
- Guide: Meeting at six? – það gengur!
- Crowd: Great, you (plural) go first – þið farið á undan.
- Announcer: They go when the doors open – þau fara þegar hurðirnar opnast.

Culture tip: Reykjavik ready

Sound local, du, with tiny phrases that carry big friendly vibes.

- Everyday classic: “Let’s go to the pool!” → Förum í sund.
- Heading home? Say: “We go now” → við förum núna.
- Agreeing to plans without drama: “It works” → það gengur.

Speed drill: Say it before I do

I’ll cue the English; du fire the Icelandic. Quick and bold!
