- Key idea: have = avere.
- I have → io ho (often just ho).
- you have → tu hai (singular).
- he has → lui ha.
- she has → lei ha.
- it has → ha.
- we have → noi abbiamo.
- you have (plural) → avete.
- they have → loro hanno.

Forms with rhythm

Clap or tap the table with me – rhythm makes memory stick.

- I have – ho.
- you have – hai.
- he has – ha; she has – lei ha; it has – ha.
- we have – noi abbiamo.
- you have (plural) – avete.
- they have – loro hanno.
- Chant: have = avere... ho, hai, ha, abbiamo, avete, hanno!

Tiny dialogues

Now you, du – step into real talk. Repeat after me.

- A: Do you have the map? B: Sì, ho la mappa.
- A: He has the tickets. B: Great! → Lui ha i biglietti.
- A: She has an idea. B: Tell me! → Lei ha un'idea.
- A: It has a new battery. B: Perfect. → Ha una batteria nuova.
- A: We have time. B: Awesome. → Noi abbiamo tempo.
- A: You have (plural) the keys? B: Yes! → Avete le chiavi? Sì!
- A: They have the plan. B: Let's go. → Loro hanno il piano.

Drill time: quick swaps

Fast swaps – answer in Italian. I'll cue in English; you fire the Italian.

- I have a book → Ho un libro.
- You have time (singular) → Hai tempo.
- He has the key → Ha la chiave.
- She has coffee → Lei ha il caffè.
- It has two doors → Ha due porte.
- We have a car → Noi abbiamo una macchina.

- You have (plural) three tickets → Avete tre biglietti.
- They have enough time → Loro hanno abbastanza tempo.

Culture tip: feel it like an Italian

Tiny secret that makes you sound local.

In Italian, some feelings and age use have, not be: “I am hungry” → Ho fame; “She is 20 years old” → Lei ha vent’anni.

Fun quiz

Quick brain-boost – say the answer out loud.

- 1) Translate: we have a problem → Noi abbiamo un problema or simply Abbiamo un problema.
- 2) Which is “you have (plural)”? Answer: avete.
- 3) Fill the blank: She has the map → Lei - - - - la mappa. Answer: ha.
- 4) True or false: it has = ha. Answer: True.
- 5) Base verb of have? Answer: avere.

Challenge round

Level up, du! Say each English cue in Italian – nice and confident.

- I have an idea → Ho un’idea.
- You have a message (singular) → Hai un messaggio.

- He has two emails → Ha due email.
- We have everything → Noi abbiamo tutto.
- You have (plural) time today → Avete tempo oggi.
- They have the tickets already → Loro hanno già i biglietti.
- Recap chant: have = avere → ho, hai, ha, abbiamo, avete, hanno.

Your learning goal today

In two minutes, you'll say who you are, where you are, and how you are – confidently.

- Target: the verb 'to be' = **essere**.
- I am = **sono**.
- You are (singular, informal) = **sei**.
- He is = **lui è**. She is = **lei è**. It is = **è**.
- We are = **noi siamo**. You are (plural) = **siete**. They are = **sono**.

Funny warm-up

Loosen your tongue and your smile – repeat after me!

- I am awesome: say “**sono fantastico/fantastica**.”
- You are ready (to one friend): “**sei pronto/pronta**.”
- He is on time: “**lui è puntuale**.”
- She is the DJ: “**lei è la DJ**.”
- It is open: “**è aperto**.”
- We are a team: “**noi siamo una squadra**.”
- You are legends (to a group): “**siete leggende**.”
- They are happy: “**sono felici**.”

Mini dialogue: At the door

Act this out with me – you'll sound natural fast.

- A: Who's there?
- B: I am Alex – “sono Alex.”
- A: Great! You are on time – “Bravo, sei puntuale.”
- B: And the band?
- A: They are inside – “sono dentro.”
- B: The stage, it is ready – “Il palco è pronto.”
- A: Perfect. We are excited – “noi siamo entusiasti.”
- B: You are (plural) amazing – “siete fantastici!”
- A: He is the drummer, she is the singer – “lui è il batterista, lei è la cantante.”

Call-and-response drills

I'll say the English; you fire back the Italian – out loud!

- I am at home → say: “sono a casa.”
- You are kind (singular) → “sei gentile.”
- He is ready → “lui è pronto.”
- She is smart → “lei è intelligente.”
- It is enough → “è sufficiente.”
- We are friends → “noi siamo amici.”
- You are (plural) in Rome → “siete a Roma.”
- They are late → “sono in ritardo.”

Culture tip: Keep it natural

Speak like natives while keeping it friendly ‘tu’-style.

In Italian, you often drop the pronoun because the verb already tells who: “sono Marco” is enough for “I am Marco.” Mind the accent: “è” means “is/it is,” while plain “e” means “and.” Use *sei* for one friend (you are), *siete* for a group (you are plural). For formal you, Italians use “*Lei è*” with a capital L. Tiny words, big vibes.

Quiz time

Quick checks – answer before the pause!

- Fill it in: “The museum - - - - open.” Answer: “è aperto.”
- Translate: “We are ready.” → “noi siamo pronti.”
- Translate (to one friend): “You are funny.” → “sei simpatico/simpatica.”
- Pick the right one (group): “You are amazing” → “siete fantastici!”
- Say it: “He is my brother; she is my sister.” → “lui è mio fratello; lei è mia sorella.”
- Translate: “They are here.” → “sono qui.”
- Key verb check: “‘to be’ in Italian is...?” → “essere.”

Lightning challenge

Now chain them without thinking – go!

- Say all present forms fast: I am, you are, he is, she is, it is, we are, you are (plural), they are → “sono, sei, lui è, lei è, è, noi siamo, siete, sono.”
- Make a tiny story using three forms of ‘to be’ (essere): e.g., “I am new, you are kind, it is easy!” → “sono nuovo/nuova, sei gentile, è facile!”

- Crowd: Vanno tutti allo stadio! (They go to the stadium!)
- Friend: How's it going? You: Così così. (So-so.)

Culture tip: the power of andare

Sound local with tiny upgrades.

At Italian matches you'll hear "Andiamo!" from andare – "Let's go!" Use it with friends to spark momentum. Green light vibes only.

Drill time: fast swaps

I give English, you shoot Italian. Say it before I reveal it!

- We go → ... Answer: noi andiamo.
- They go → ... Answer: vanno.
- You go (plural) → ... Answer: voi andate.
- He goes → ... Answer: lui va.
- She goes → ... Answer: lei va.
- To go (infinitive) → ... Answer: andare.
- So-so → ... Answer: così così.
