Lesson 1: Master have in Kazakh: бар (bar)

Learn how to say I have, you have (singular and plural), he has, she has, it has, we have, and they have using natural phrases like менде бар (mende bar) and оларда бар (olarda bar). Today you'll nail have in Kazakh – aka бар (bar) – with quick patterns, funny mini-scenes, and a speedy quiz.

Warm up your voice and your thumbs, because you'll say I have, you have, he has, she has, it has, we have, you-all have, and they have like a pro.

Your goal today

In minutes, you'll confidently say what you have – no complicated verb tables needed. Ready?

- Core idea: Kazakh uses a location + exist pattern instead of a have verb.
- have = бар (bar) (there is/are).
- I have = менде бар (mende bar).
- You have (singular) = сенде бар (sende bar).
- He has = оның бар (oniñ bar).
- She has = оның бар (oniñ bar).
- It has / There is = бар (bar) or at-it: онда бар (onda bar).
- We have = бізде бар (bizde bar).
- You have (plural, informal) = сендерде бар (senderde bar).
- They have = оларда бар (olarda bar).

Forms remix: clap and say it

Clap once, then repeat after me out loud. Go!

- I have – менде бар (mende bar).

- You have (sg) – сенде бар (sende bar).
- He has – оның бар (onıň bar).
- She has – оның бар (onıň bar).
- It has – бар (bar) / онда бар (onda bar).
- We have – бізде бар (bizde bar).
- You have (plural) – сендерде бар (senderde bar).
- They have – оларда бар (olarda bar).
- Bonus negation: don't have = жоқ (joq) (for example: I don't have = менде жоқ (mende joq)).

Mini dialogue: the mystery of the missing pen

Listen once, then echo the Kazakh parts.

- A: Do you have a pen? – You have?
- B: Yes, I have – Менде бар (Mende bar).
- A: Great. Does she have paper? – She has?
- B: Yes, оның бар (onıň bar).
- A: And the bag – does it have a charger?
- B: Yes, it has – бар (bar)!
- A: Team check: Do we have snacks?
- B: We have – бізде бар (bizde bar).
- A: Do you all have the tickets? (plural)

- Group: Yes, we do – сендерде бар (senderde bar)!
- A: Perfect. Do they have the map?
- B: They have – оларда бар (olarda bar). Adventure time!

Quick drills: English to Kazakh

Say it in English, then hit the Kazakh fast. I'll give you a beat.

- have → бар (bar)
- I have → менде бар (mende bar)
- you have (sg) → сенде бар (sende bar)
- he has → оның бар (onıñ bar)
- she has → оның бар (onıñ bar)
- it has → онда бар (onda bar) or simply бар (bar)
- we have → бізде бар (bizde bar)
- you have (plural) → сендерде бар (senderde bar)
- they have → оларда бар (olarda bar)

Culture tip: hospitality hack

Use these phrases to shine in Kazakh hospitality moments.

- As a guest: Do you have tea? – Шай бар ма? (Shai bar ma?)

- As a host: We have everything! – Бізде бәрі бар!
(Bizde bári bar!)
- When pointing to a shop shelf: They have fresh bread
– Оларда жаңа наң бар (Olarda jaña nan bar).

Funny beat: the not-a-pub bar

Quick joke time to lock it in.

Remember: English bar is a pub, but Kazakh бар (bar) means have or there is. A pirate yells, What do we have?! The crew chants: бар! (bar!) You: nailed it.

Quiz time

Answer out loud, then I reveal the key.

- 1) Kazakh for I have? Answer: менде бар (mende bar).
- 2) Kazakh for you have (singular)? Answer: сенде бар (sende bar).
- 3) Kazakh for he has / she has? Answer: оның бар (onıñ bar).
- 4) Kazakh for it has? Answer: бар (bar) or онда бар (onda bar).
- 5) Kazakh for we have? Answer: бізде бар (bizde bar).
- 6) Kazakh for you have (plural)? Answer: сендерде бар (senderde bar).
- 7) Kazakh for they have? Answer: оларда бар (olarda bar).

Your speaking challenge

Ready for a lightning round? Speak each sentence with confidence.

- Say: I have water. – Менде су бар (Mende su bar).
- Say: You have the keys. (sg) – Кілт сенде бар (Kilt sende bar).
- Say: He has a ticket. – Оның билеті бар (Oniñ biletі bar).
- Say: She has time. – Оның уақыты бар (Oniñ uaqyty bar).
- Say: It has Wi-Fi. – Wi-Fi бар (Wi-Fi bar).
- Say: We have a plan. – Бізде жоспар бар (Bizde jospar bar).
- Say: You all have snacks. – Тәамақ сендерде бар (Támak senderde bar).
- Say: They have a car. – Оларда көлік бар (Olarda kölik bar).

Lesson 2

Lesson 2: To Be in Kazakh: болу (bolu) – I am, You Are, We Are

Master the English – Kazakh verb “to be” – болу (bolu) – with a funny, bite-size lesson. We’ll map I am, you are, he is, she is, it is, we are, you (plural) are, and they are to natural Kazakh forms like менмін (menmin), сенсің (sensiñ), ол (ol), бұл (bul), Біз (Biz), -сыңдар/-сіңдер (syndar/siñder), and олар (olar). Learn why Kazakh often drops “is” in the present and how болу (bolu) shows up in other tenses. Perfect for “learn Kazakh,” “English – Kazakh podcast,” “English Kasachisch lernen,” and “to be / болу (bolu) meaning” searches.

Your goal today

In 8 minutes you’ll say who you are, who they are, and what it is – smoothly.

Focus points: 1) Present tense often has zero copula in Kazakh. 2) You still need personal endings like -сындар/-сіндер (syndar/siñder) for plural “you.” 3) The infinitive “to be” is болу (bolu). You’ve got this!

Forms jam (short and sweet)

Repeat after me and feel the rhythm.

- To be → болу (bolu).
- I am → мәнмін (menmin). Example: “Міне, мәнмін! (Mine, menmin!)”
- You (sing.) are → сенсің (sensiñ). Example: “The winner – сенсің (sensiñ).”
- He/She is → ол (ol). Example: “Ол дәрігер (Ol därliger).”
- It is → бұл (bul). Example: “Бұл кітап (Bul kitap).”
- We are → Біз (Biz). Example: “Біз дайынбыз (Biz dayynbyz).”

- You (plural) are → ending -сыңдар/-сіңдер (syn-dar/siñder). Example: “Сендер кереметсіңдер (Sender keremetsiñder).”
- They are → олар (olar). Example: “Олар студенттер (Olar studentter).”

Mini-dialogue (fun \ real)

Listen, repeat, and smile – you've got this.

- A: Who's at the door? B: Менмін! (Menmin!)
- A: Great. And the courier? B: Ол (Ol).
- A: What is this? B: Бұл карта (Bul karta).
- A: Are we ready? B: Біз дайынбыз (Biz dayynbyz)!
- Coach to the group: Сендер чемпионсыңдар! (Sender chempionsyñdar!)
- Narrator: Олар осында (Olar osynda) – they are here.

Culture tip: the invisible “is”

Tiny grammar, big confidence boost.

In Kazakh present tense, “is/are” often vanishes – you can just say ол (ol) (he/she is), бұл (bul) (it is), or add endings like “Біз дайынбыз (Biz dayynbyz)” (we are ready) and “Сендер дайынсыңдар (Sender dayynsyñdar)” (you plural are ready). For drama fans: To be or not to be? In Kazakh that's “болу (bolu) әлде болмай (bolmau)?” Shakespeare approves.

Drill time

Quick call-and-response – say the Kazakh out loud.

- It is a book → Бұл кітап (Bul kitap).
- I am here → Міне, мемін (Mine, menmin).
- You (sing.) are the guide → Бүгін гид – сенсің (Bugin gid – sensiñ).
- He is a doctor → Ол дәрігер (Ol däriger).
- She is polite → Ол сүпайы (Ol sypaiy).
- We are friends → Біз достармыз (Biz dostarmyz).
- You (plural) are ready → Сендер дайынсыңдар (Sender dayynsyñdar).
- They are students → Олар студенттер (Olar studentter).

Quick quiz

Answer, then I'll reveal it after a short pause.

- Q1: Which Kazakh infinitive means “to be”? A: болу (bolu).
- Q2: How do you say “I am”? A: мемін (menmin).
- Q3: Fill the blank: The winner – you are. → сенсің (sensiñ).
- Q4: What’s the word for “it is”? A: бұл (bul).
- Q5: Plural informal “you are” ending? A: -сыңдар/-сіңдер (syndar/siñder).
- Q6: Say “they are”: A: олар (oliar).

Challenge round

Beat the clock: say the Kazakh before I do!

- I am → мәнмін (menmin)
- You (sing.) are → сенсің (sensiñ)

- A: Coffee first? B: Meh, жаман емес (jaman emes), but I prefer to leave now. I go: Мен барамын (Men baramyn).
- A: Okay, you go: барасың (barasyń), and I'll lock the door.
- C (pointing at Anna): She goes: ол барады (ol barady) ahead to grab seats.
