Your goal today

In just a few minutes, you'll say nine core forms like a pro.

We'll nail the base verb ha and the must-know present forms: jag har, du har, han har, hon har, det har, vi har, ni har, de har. Imagine them as your tiny superpowers for everyday talk.

Forms at a glance

Repeat after me – short, punchy, memorable.

- Base form: ha (to have).
- I have: jag har.
- You (singular) have: du har.
- He has: han har.
- She has: hon har.
- It has: det har.
- We have: vi har.
- You (plural) have: ni har.
- They have: de har.
- Pro tip: questions flip word order – “Do you have?”
→ har du?

Mini dialogue at fika

Time for cinnamon rolls, coffee, and quick wins.

- You: I want to have a bun – Jag vill ha en bulle.
- Friend: Relax, du har tid. (You have time.)
- You: Great, jag har pengar. (I have money.)
- Barista: For the table, vi har kaffe och bullar. (We have coffee and buns.)
- You (to a group): Hey team, ni har biljetterna, va? (You all have the tickets, right?)
- Friend: The weather? det har blivit bättre. (It has gotten better.)
- Gossip guy: Look, han har en ny mössa! (He has a new beanie!)
- Gossip gal: And hon har bästa skrattet. (She has the best laugh.)
- All: Don't worry, de har allt för picknicken. (They have everything for the picnic.)

Quick drills

You answer out loud – I'll wait with dramatic pauses.

- Say in Swedish: I have a book. Answer: jag har en bok.
- Say: You (sing.) have the key. Answer: du har nyckeln.

- Say: He has time today. Answer: han har tid i dag.
- Say: She has a plan. Answer: hon har en plan.
- Say: It has a red door. Answer: det har en röd dörr.
- Say: We have coffee. Answer: vi har kaffe.
- Say: You (plural) have tickets. Answer: ni har biljetter.
- Say: They have everything. Answer: de har allt.
- Bonus: To have (dictionary form). Answer: ha.

Culture tip: Fika power

Swedish coffee breaks are a lifestyle – use the language while you sip.

During fika you'll hear requests with vill ha + thing: "I want to have coffee" → Jag vill ha kaffe. Then brag kindly about possession: "vi har kanelbullar!" (We have cinnamon buns!) Bring this to life at your next café stop.

Pop quiz

Fast questions – trust your gut.

- Q: How do you say "you have" to one friend? A: du har.
- Q: "They have" in Swedish? A: de har.
- Q: The base verb "have" (dictionary form)? A: ha.
- Q: "It has started" begins with which two words? A: det har ...
- Q: "We have" for your group? A: vi har.

Challenge time

Make it yours – tiny reps, big gains.

- Record three lines about your day using: jag har, du har, vi har.
- Example: “jag har ett möte”, “du har bra energi”, “vi har en plan.”
- Level up: add one of these – han har, hon har, det har, ni har, de har.

Grab your imaginary fika mug and repeat after me: the heart of Swedish being is vara. Spoiler: you'll soon say jag är awesome – because you are!

Your goal today

In two minutes you'll sound more Swedish than your coffee mug. Ready?

- Say all the present forms smoothly: jag är, du är, han är, hon är, det är, vi är, ni är, de är.
- Know the base infinitive: vara.
- Use them in mini-scenes without sweating the grammar.

Forms at a glance

Repeat after me – clap if it helps you keep rhythm.

- I am = jag är
- you are (singular) = du är
- he is = han är, she is = hon är, it is = det är
- we are = vi är, you are (plural) = ni är, they are = de är
- Infinitive to be = vara

Mini-dialogue at fika

Listen in – you'll hear every form in a cozy coffee scene.

- A: Who are you? B: jag är Alex.
- A: Nice – du är tidig.
- C (points at the door): han är sen, but no stress.
- B (smiles): Good news – hon är här now!
- A (shivers): Wow, det är kallt outside.
- All: Team time – vi är redo for buns.
- Barista (to the group): ni är nästa!
- Crowd (cheering): de är våra vänner – make room!

Call-and-response drill

Your turn – say it out loud before I reveal the answer.

- Say: I am ready. Answer: jag är redo.
- Say: you are kind (singular). Answer: du är snäll.
- Say: he is here. Answer: han är här.
- Say: she is a doctor. Answer: hon är läkare.
- Say: it is tasty. Answer: det är gott.
- Say: we are on time. Answer: vi är i tid.
- Say: you are amazing (to a group). Answer: ni är fantastiska.
- Say: they are ready. Answer: de är redo.
- Bonus: the infinitive ‘to be’. Answer: att vara.

Culture tip and gotchas

Sound natural with these quick fixes.

- Professions often skip the article: say hon är läkare (she is doctor), not 'she is a doctor'.
- Statement vs question: statement det är bra; question är det bra?
- Negation is easy: jag är inte trött; de är inte här.
- Infinitive pairs with 'att': att vara sig själv = to be yourself.

Speed quiz

Reflex check – beat me to the answer!

- English: they are → Swedish? de är.
- English: we are → vi är.
- English: you are (plural) → ni är.
- English: I am → jag är.
- English: to be (infinitive) → vara.
- English: he is / she is / it is → han är / hon är / det är.

Challenge: one-breath mantra

Deep breath – then fly through the whole chain with me.

jag är du är han är hon är det är vi är ni är de är att vara
– nailed it!

Goal: know and say these forms at natural speed – gå, jag går, du går, han går, hon går, det går, vi går, ni går, de går. You'll also use 'it works' with det går in real contexts.

Forms in a minute

Repeat after me – nice and bold; your neighbors will be impressed.

- to go/walk – gå
- I go – jag går
- you go (singular, du) – du går
- he goes – han går
- she goes – hon går
- it goes / it works – det går
- we go – vi går
- you go (plural) – ni går
- they go – de går

Mini dialogue at the café

Listen first, then shadow the Swedish parts. Imagine we're late for fika.

- A: Ready to leave? B: Yes – vi går nu.

- A: You go first – du går först. I'll grab napkins.
- B: If the door is stuck, no worries – det går, just push.
- A: Look, there he is – han går in with a big smile.
- B: And Anna? A: There – hon går by the window.
- B: When the group arrives, ni går to the big table; I'll wave.
- A: Perfect, the students just texted: de går from the station.

Speed drill: your turn

I say English, you fire back in Swedish – then I confirm. Big voice!

- I go → jag går
- you go (singular) → du går
- he goes → han går
- she goes → hon går
- it goes (it works) → det går
- we go → vi går
- you go (plural) → ni går
- they go → de går
- to go (base form) → gå
