Master key words like have, I have, you have, he has, she has, it has, we have, you (plural) have, they have in minutes.

Your goal today

Your mission: connect English have with Tagalog forms you'll actually say today.

- Targets: have, I have, you have, he has, she has, it has, we have, you (plural) have, they have.
- Core idea: Base verb have = magkaroon. Everyday possession often uses may/mayroon + pronoun.

Forms at a glance

Say each line out loud – du, your voice is your gym!

- have → magkaroon (base verb, like “to have”)
- I have → mayroon ako
- you have → mayroon ka
- he has → mayroon siya
- she has → may (example: She has a book = May libro siya)
- it has → may (example: It has a key = May susi ito)

- we have (inclusive) → mayroon tayo
- you (plural) have → mayroon kayo
- they have → mayroon sila

Mini-dialogues

Listen, repeat, and smile – tiny scenes, big confidence.

- A: Do you have the tickets? B: Yes, I have them – Mayroon ako nito.
- A: You have an umbrella, right? – Mayroon ka bang payong? B: Yep!
- A: He has the keys. – Mayroon siya ng mga susi.
- A: She has time today. – May oras siya ngayon.
- A: It has a hidden pocket. – May nakatagong bulsa ito.
- A: We have a plan. – Mayroon tayo ng plano.
- A: You (plural) have the modules, class? – Mayroon ba kayo ng mga module? B (Class): Mayroon kayo!
- A: They have extra chairs. – Mayroon sila ng mga upuan.

Drill time

Rapid-fire – du, echo me like a pro.

- have → magkaroon
- I have → mayroon ako

- you have → mayroon ka
- he has → mayroon siya
- she has → may (She has coffee = May kape siya)
- it has → may (It has Wi-Fi = May Wi-Fi ito)
- we have → mayroon tayo
- you (plural) have → mayroon kayo
- they have → mayroon sila
- Bonus switch: To have a dog (base) = magkaroon ng aso.

Culture tip: keep it natural

Sound native with two tiny tricks.

- 1) Everyday speech loves may/mayroon. Use may before nouns (e.g., May libro siya); use mayroon comfortably before pronouns (e.g., Mayroon ako).
- 2) Inclusive we have is mayroon tayo (includes your listener). Exclusive is mayroon kami (not including your listener). Today we focus on inclusive: we have = mayroon tayo.
- Pro move: If you only remember one base verb, make it magkaroon for “to have.”

Quick quiz

Answer aloud – no judgment, just gains.

- Q1: Say I have in Tagalog. A: mayroon ako.

- Q2: Say you have (singular). A: mayroon ka.
- Q3: Turn she has a book into Tagalog. A: May libro siya.
- Q4: Say we have (inclusive) time. A: Mayroon tayo ng oras.
- Q5: Translate they have money. A: Mayroon sila ng pera.
- Speed bonus: Base “have” in Tagalog? A: magkaroon.

Challenge scene

Role-play this fast moment – du, you’re the hero.

- Scenario: At the gate, the guard asks for tickets. You answer for your group.
- You (to the guard): We have the tickets. – Mayroon tayo ng mga tiket.
- Friend whispers: Do you have an extra pen? – You: Yes, I have one. Mayroon ako nito.
- Guard points at your bag: It has a scissors inside? – You: Yes, it has. May gunting ito. (Oops – remove it!)
- Narrator wink: Victory unlocked – you used we have, I have, and it has like a boss.

Nice work – light speed progress today!

You linked have → magkaroon and mastered I have → mayroon ako, you have → mayroon ka, he has → mayroon siya, she/it has → may, we have → mayroon tayo, you (plural) have → mayroon kayo, they have → mayroon sila. Beat the forms

- I am = ako ay... example: ako ay handa.
- You are (singular) = ikaw ay... example: ikaw ay magaling.
- He/She is = siya ay... example: siya ay mabait.
- It is/This is = ito ay... example: ito ay masarap.
- We are (inclusive) = tayo ay... example: tayo ay handa.
- You are (plural/polite) = kayo ay... example: kayo ay panalo.
- They are = sila ay... example: sila ay kumpleto.

Tiny dialogues

Let's talk like real humans – well, funnier ones.

- A: Mirror check! ikaw ay handa. B: Salamat! And coffee? ito ay mainit!
- A: Where's Alex? B: siya ay nasa bahay.
- Coach: Team, listen – tayo ay iisang koponan!
Crowd: Yes! Coach: And kayo ay malakas!
- Announcer: Look – sila ay narito na!

Magic of maging

Use this power-verb to set goals and transform.

- To be/to become = maging. Try it: Gusto kong maging kalmado.
- Bonus forms: maging → naging → nagiging → magiging.
- Affirmation: Today I will maging handa. Coffee mug joke: To bean? Nope – maging!

Culture tip

Sound local and confident, one phrase at a time.

You'll hear proud lines like "Ako ay Pilipino" in songs and events – exactly "I am Filipino." Use the pattern for intros: "ako ay estudyante," "ako ay bisita," or point things out in class: "ito ay mapa." Keep it natural, keep it smiling.

Quick quiz

Say your answers out loud before I reveal them.

- Q1: Tagalog for “to be”? A: maging.
- Q2: Say “I am ready.” A: ako ay handa.
- Q3: Say “you are (singular) kind.” A: ikaw ay mabait.
- Q4: Make it plural/polite: “you are champions.” A: kayo ay kampeon.
- Q5: Point to a map: “it is the Philippines.” A: ito ay Pilipinas.
- Q6: Introduce a friend: “she is a doctor.” A: siya ay doktor.
- Q7: Rally the group: “we are not late.” A: tayo ay hindi huli.
- Q8: Announce arrivals: “they are here.” A: sila ay narito.
