Today you’ll conquer the English verb “have” in Malay:

ada and friends like saya ada, awak ada, kamu ada, dia ada, ia mempunyai, kami ada, and mereka ada. Ready? Let's go!

Your goal today

By the end, you'll say every form of "have" with confidence.

- have → ada
- I have → saya ada
- you have (singular, casual) → awak ada
- you have (you all/plural) → kamu ada
- he has → dia ada
- she has → dia ada
- it has → ia mempunyai
- we have → kami ada
- they have → mereka ada

Forms fast-track

Repeat after me – short, punchy, and smile-level easy.

- have: ada
- I have a plan: I have → saya ada. Example: "I have a plan" → "saya ada rancangan."
- You have time (singular): you have → awak ada. "Do you have time?" → "awak ada masa?"

- You have tickets (plural you): you have → kamu ada. “You have three tickets” → “kamu ada tiga tiket.”
- He has a book: he has → dia ada. “dia ada buku.”
- She has an idea: she has → dia ada. “dia ada idea.”
- It has a new feature: it has → ia mempunyai. “ia mempunyai ciri baharu.”
- We have water: we have → kami ada. “kami ada air.”
- They have two cars: they have → mereka ada. “mereka ada dua kereta.”

Mini dialogues

Listen, then echo the Malay line out loud. You’ve got this!

- A: Do you have a pen? B: Yes, I have one. → A: “Do you have a pen?” B: “Ya, saya ada satu.”
- A: You have the keys, right? → “awak ada kunci, kan?”
- Guide: You all have tickets? → “kamu ada tiket?”
Team: “Yes, kami ada!”
- Whisper: He has the map. → “dia ada peta.”
- Update: She has the files. → “dia ada fail.”
- Review: It has two wheels. → “ia mempunyai dua roda.”
- Report: They have a new idea. → “mereka ada idea baharu.”

Rhythm drill: clap and say

Clap on each bold word – then speak the Malay. Add a grin for extra fluency.

- I HAVE → saya ada
- YOU HAVE (sing.) → awak ada
- YOU HAVE (plural) → kamu ada
- HE HAS → dia ada
- SHE HAS → dia ada
- IT HAS → ia mempunyai
- WE HAVE → kami ada
- THEY HAVE → mereka ada
- BASE WORD 'have' → ada

Culture tip: sounding natural

Here's how locals keep it simple and clear.

In Malay, **ada** covers both “have” and “there is/are”. For everyday possession, you’ll hear **saya ada**, **awak ada**, **kamu ada**, **dia ada**, **kami ada**, **mereka ada**. For “it has,” formal speech often uses **ia mempunyai**, but casual speech can use **ia ada**. To negate, say **tidak ada** or the short form **tiada** (colloquial: **tak ada**). Example: “We don’t have time” → “**kami tidak ada masa.**”

Quick quiz

Answer fast – say it before you hear it.

- Q1: Translate “I have time.” → “saya ada masa.”
- Q2: Translate “You have (singular) a message.” → “awak ada mesej.”
- Q3: Translate “You have (plural) three tickets.” → “kamu ada tiga tiket.”
- Q4: Translate “He has the keys.” → “dia ada kunci.”
- Q5: Translate “She has an idea.” → “dia ada idea.”
- Q6: Translate “It has a new feature.” → “ia mempunyai ciri baharu.”
- Q7: Translate “We have water.” → “kami ada air.”
- Q8: Translate “They have a plan.” → “mereka ada rancangan.”

Challenge: speed role-play

Pretend you’re at a ticket counter. Answer confidently!

- Agent: Do you have your passport? You (singular): “Yes, I have it.” → “Ya, saya ada.”
- Agent: Does he have the receipt? You: “Yes, he has it.” → “Ya, dia ada.”
- Agent: Do you all have the tickets? Group reply: “Yes, we have them.” → “Ya, kami ada.”
- Agent: Do they have the forms? You: “Yes, they have them.” → “Ya, mereka ada.”

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- Tech check: Does it have two wheels? You: “Yes, it has two wheels.” → “Ya, ia mempunyai dua roda.”

Laugh break

Tiny joke to lock in memory.

When someone asks, “Do you have it?” you can channel your inner magician and say, “Ada! It just appeared in my pocket.”

Wrap-up and next steps

You did great – high five!

Your goal today

You'll learn exactly when and how to say 'I am', 'you are', and friends – with a smile.

- Think of 'be' as linguistic glue. In Malay, the glue is *adalah* and *ialah*. Quick map:
- I am → *saya ialah*
- you are (singular) → *kamu ialah*
- he is (before a noun/role) → *ialah* (e.g., *Dia ialah pemenang.*)
- she is → *dia ialah*
- it is → *ia ialah*
- we are (excluding the listener) → *kami adalah*
- you are (plural) → *kamu semua adalah*
- they are → *mereka adalah*
- Bonus: formal/definitional 'is/are' → *adalah*.

Forms at a glance

Say these out loud with me; your mouth remembers what your brain forgets.

- “I am the guide.” → saya ialah pemandu pelancong.
- “You are my friend.” → kamu ialah kawan saya.
- “He is the winner.” → Dia ialah pemenang.
- “She is the manager.” → dia ialah pengurus.
- “It is a circle.” → ia ialah bulatan.
- “We are students.” → kami adalah pelajar.
- “You all are champions!” → kamu semua adalah juara!
- “They are our partners.” → mereka adalah rakan kongsi kami.
- “This is the truth.” → Ini adalah kebenaran.

Mini dialogue: The Identity Parade

Enjoy this quick scene – repeat the Malay bits boldly.

- Host: Welcome! Who are we meeting today?
- Me: Hi, saya ialah Amir, your snack-loving guide.
- Host: And you?
- You: Surprise – kamu ialah kapten hari ini! Wear the imaginary cape.
- Host: Who’s that with the trophy?
- Crowd: Dia ialah pemenang!
- Host: And her?
- Stagehand: dia ialah pengurus acara.

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- Host: What's this shiny thing?
 - Guide: ia ialah pingat emas.
 - Team: kami adalah satu pasukan!
 - Coach: Hey, kamu semua adalah legenda!
 - Announcer: Malam ini, mereka adalah bintang utama.

Call-and-response drills

I'll prompt in English; you answer in Malay. Speak fast; laugh faster.

- I am the winner. Answer: saya ialah pemenang.
- You are my friend. Answer: kamu ialah kawan saya.
- He is the leader. Answer: Dia ialah ketua.
- She is the singer. Answer: dia ialah penyanyi.
- It is an island. Answer: ia ialah sebuah pulau.
- We are students. Answer: kami adalah pelajar.
- You all are the best. Answer: kamu semua adalah yang terbaik.
- They are the guests. Answer: mereka adalah tetamu.
- This is the plan. Answer: Ini adalah rancangan.

Culture tip \ quick fix

Here's how to sound natural, not textbook-robot.

- Malay often drops 'to be' before adjectives: "I am happy" → Saya gembira (no copula).
- For identities/roles with nouns, use ialah patterns like "Dia ialah guru" or the specific forms: saya ialah, kamu ialah, dia ialah, ia ialah.
- Formal definitions use adalah: "Ini adalah definisi."
- Plural 'you' matters: talk to a group with kamu semua adalah, not the singular kamu ialah.
- Teams love unity lines like kami adalah juara and mereka adalah rakan kami.

Quick quiz

Answer out loud; your couch won't judge.

- Q1: 'You (plural) are champions.' Say it in Malay. A: kamu semua adalah juara.
- Q2: 'He is the coach.' A: Dia ialah jurulatih.
- Q3: 'It is a circle.' A: ia ialah bulatan.
- Q4: 'We are friends.' A: kami adalah kawan-kawan.
- Q5: Fill the blank: 'This - - - a definition.' → 'Ini - - - definisi.' A: Ini adalah definisi.
- Q6: 'They are our partners.' A: mereka adalah rakan kongsi kami.
- Q7: 'She is the manager.' A: dia ialah pengurus.

Speak-up challenge

Time to flex. You've got this!

- Make three identity sentences about your world. Example ideas:
 - 1) Introduce yourself: "saya ialah ... (your role)."
 - 2) Point at an object: "ia ialah ... (what it is)."
 - 3) Cheer for your group: "kami adalah ... (your team)."
- Bonus shout-out to friends: "kamu semua adalah ... (awesome, brilliant, legends!)."
- Finish by labeling another group: "mereka adalah ... (guests, winners, partners)."
